1) Henna	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> It is a dye blend made from a plant by the same name. It was used in Egypt as far back as in Cleopatra's time, who is said to have used it herself for decorative purposes. It is used to decorate the bride's hands and feet before the wedding. Relatives and friends of the bride gather to help decorate the bride and each other on a special say called the 'Henna Night'. This is so embedded in the culture that there are special songs for that night. This tradition has been present for a long time in several other cultures.
2) Arabic Coffee	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> There are two types of coffee served in the Arab world: the sweet 'Turkish' coffee, and the bitter 'Arabic' coffee (قهوة سادة). Both types are brewed in a special pot called (dallah دلة); however, Turkish coffee is served in cups with handles and saucers, whilst Arabic coffee is served in cups without handles or saucers; both types of cups are called (finjaan فنجان). The server holds a stack of cups and goes round filling up to a third of the cup, and will keep refilling the cup until the guest shakes the cup indicating he/she has had enough. The word 'mocha' comes from the name of a Yemeni port (المخاء) where coffee used to be exported to the rest of the world.
3) Customs around Eating	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Nowadays, most Arabs use cutlery when eating most meals. However, there are still some meals that are eaten by hand such as rice. Furthermore, in many cultures in the past and present, some main meals are eaten by hand. Hand-to-mouth eating etiquette occurs throughout the Arab world and many parts of Africa and Asia.
4) Greeting people in Arab society/culture	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Some do shake hands, especially in formal situations, but many people avoid from shaking hands. Touching noses can also be seen in some Arab societies and is inherited from Bedouin tradition. This can also be seen in many indigenous cultures around the world. The word 'Salam' means peace, and it is the most common greeting of all. It is used by people from all religions and in many situations. It can be used to say hello or goodbye or to wish someone good health or safe travel.
